HOST CLUB RETAIN ALLAN SCALLY TROPHY

October 30th

IT was dry and crisp for the Allan Scally 4x5 miles relay promoted by Shettleston Harriers, unlike last year, but the variable wind factor over a period of 1½ hours has to be considered in assessing individual performances, where the significance was in the man-to-man contest on each lap, rather than lap times. For instance, Henry Summerhill's 23.05 put Shettleston in second place on the first lap but with 22.58 Dick Wedlock dropped to fourth: then, with exactly the same time, Paul Bannon hauled Shettleston to first, and Lachie Stewart's 22.36, fifth fastest of the day was enough to see them home by exactly the day, was enough to see them home by exactly a minute over Victoria Park.

As in the McAndrew relay, Willie Day of Falkirk Victoria led on the first lap, followed at 20 seconds by Summerhill, with Heron (Aberdeen), Martin (Dumbarton) and Barrow (Victoria Park), at a few seconds interval, and Faulds (Clydesdale) at a few seconds back. Monkland were in 27th place but a great run by junior Jim Brown on the second lap brought them up to fifth, with Victoria Park's Maclagan also putting in a powerful effort to lead at the change-over, followed by veteran Alastair Wood for Aberdeen, with Fal-kirk Victoria dropping to third and Shettleston fourth.

Young Bannon leap-frogged over these three on the next lap, with Clydesdale's Gemmell coming up to fifth, and Monkland's Drysdale kept the Coatbridge club in contention in sixth place. Feature of the last lap was Ron MacDonald's third fastest lap of the day to take Monkland into third place, and Andy McKean, with second fastest lap, "lifted" Edinburgh University to ninth.

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EDINBURGH—GLASGOW RACE October 23rd

For the first thirty miles into a headwind, Alex Wight (Edinburgh AC) maintained an astonishing 6-minute-mile pace but the effort took its toll in the later miles: in the next five miles he slumped to 8-minute-mile pace, perked up to 7-minute miles and then took an agonising three-quarters of an hour to cover the remaining four miles into the heart of Glasgow. That doughty Vet, Willie Russell (Shettleston), hung on tenaciously for ten miles and was just over five minutes behind Wight at 20 miles, when half the field of fourteen had at 20 miles, when half the field of Toutleet had called it a day. Willie, however, lost another ten minutes over the next five miles but stuck courageously to his task and overall on the last nineteen miles added only 7½ minutes to his deficit. The course record of 4:36.13 was set by Jim Logan Bill Stoddart in 1969.
