

Clyde fight back for relay win

From an inauspicious seventeenth place on the first leg Clyde Valley thrust their way through a record entry of 86 teams in Saturday's Allan Scally Memorial Relay for a 250-yard victory over the favourites, Shettleston Harriers.

For the second successive week Shettleston's Nat Muir the European junior champion, was staring vainly towards the horizon for just a glimpse of his quarry, this time Jim Brown (Clyde Valley) as he waited to be released into action on the last leg by his incoming man.

By the time that happened Muir was fourth and although he picked off two on the way round and set a course record of 21min. 52sec. for the 41-mile circuit Brown was never in any danger. In fact, with an inspired run, he clocked 21-59, the second fastest of the afternoon.

Shettleston's cause was really undermined on the first leg when Jim Burns brought them home in ninth place while ironically Lachie Stewart, the lead off man in their second team, was second, 16 seconds faster.

But whether Shettleston would have won with Stewart in the first team is mere

speculation. Certainly Muir would have been more of a threat to Brown simply by being about 100 yards nearer him when they both set off, but the two of them were in uncompromising mood on that last leg.

Throughout the entire race some heroic improvements in position were being effected. John Graham lifted Clyde Valley from seventeenth to second on stage 2 while Andy McKean took Edinburgh AC from eleventh

into the lead on the same leg.

Spare some admiration, too, for Donald Macgregor, one of Britain's most experienced marathoners, who moved down to this relative sprint and in doing so brought Fife A.C. from twentieth to fourth. Results:

Record swim

Maureen Campbell, the Cumbernauld swimmer, narrowly missed the British junior record for the 100 metres breast-stroke at the Scottish age-group swimming championships in Edinburgh on Saturday, but her championship record time of 1min. 16.1sec. is inside the qualifying time for the Commonwealth Games.

Frances O'Brien, who

comes from Manchester but swims for Kirkintilloch, received the trophy for the most successful girl. In the 16-17 years group she won the 100 metres butterfly (1min. 9.1sec), 100 metres free-style (1min. 3.1sec.), and 200 metres butterfly (2min 31.7sec.).

The trophy for the most successful boy was won by Douglas Campbell (Dundee NCR), who took four titles.
